F ALBERT Albert, Susan Wittig. *The general's women: a novel* / Persevero Press, 2017

Set during the chaotic years of World War II, *The General's Women* tells the story of the conflicted relationship between General Dwight Eisenhower and Kay Summersby, his Irish driver/aide, and the impact of that relationship on Mamie Eisenhower and her life in Washington during the war. Told from three alternating points of view (Kay's, Ike's, and Mamie's), the novel charts the deepening of the relationship as Ike and Kay move from England (1942) to North Africa (1942-43) to England, France, and Germany before and after the Normandy landing (1944-45). At the end of the war, Ike is faced with the heart-wrenching choice between marrying Kay and a political future. The story continues into the post-war years, as Ike (returning to Mamie) becomes Army Chief of Staff, president of Columbia University, Supreme Commander of NATO, and president of the United States. Kay, meanwhile, struggles to create a life and work of her own, writing two memoirs: the first (*Eisenhower Was My Boss*, 1948) about her war work with Ike; the second (*Past Forgetting*, 1976) about their love affair. An author's note deals with the complicated question of the truth of Kay's story, as it finally appears in the posthumously-published *Past Forgetting*.

F BELOW Bellow, Saul. *Seize the day* / Penguin Books, 2003

Fading charmer Tommy Wilhelm has reached his day of reckoning and is scared. In his forties, he still retains a boyish impetuousness that has brought him to the brink of chaos: He is separated from his wife and children, at odds with his vain, successful father, failed in his acting career (a Hollywood agent once cast him as the "type that loses the girl"), and in a financial mess. In the course of one climactic day he reviews his past mistakes and spiritual malaise, until a mysterious philosophizing con man grants him a glorious, illuminating moment of truth and understanding, and offers him one last hope. This Penguin Classics edition contains an introduction by Cynthia Ozick.

F BOUMAN Bouman, Tom. *Dry bones in the valley: a novel* / W.W. Norton & Company, 2014

"The lone policeman in a small township on the sparse northern border of Pennsylvania, Henry Farrell expected to spend his mornings hunting and fishing, his evenings playing old-time music. Instead, he has watched the steady encroachment of gas drilling bring new wealth and erode neighborly trust. The drug trade is pushing heroin into the territory. There are outlaws cooking meth in the woods, guys Henry grew up with. When a stranger turns up dead, Henry's search for the killer will open old wounds, dredge up ancient crimes, and exact a deadly price"

F CAMERON Cameron, W. Bruce. *The dog master* / Forge, 2015

"Thirty-thousand years ago, the fate of humanity rested on our ability to adapt to the last great glaciation, when ice stormed out of the north and forced us out of the trees and onto the steppes, where we were both hunter and hunted. Wolves, too, whose fortunes rise and fall with the health of the herds, could sense something different in the wind. When Silex, the young leader of the Wolfen tribe, brings tribute to a clever she-wolf, everything changes. The

alpha wolf learns that in times of famine she can turn to man for food, a lesson passed on to her descendants"--

F CANTY Canty, Kevin. *The underworld: a novel* / W. W. Norton & Company, 2017

After a disastrous fire in an isolated silver mining town in 1970s Idaho, this novel imagines the fates of a handful of survivors and their loved ones - Jordan, a young widow with twin children; David, a college student trying to make a life for himself in another town; Lionel, a lifelong hard-rock miner - as they struggle to come to terms with the loss. It's a tough, hard-working, hard-drinking town, a town of whores and priests and bar fights, but nobody's tough enough to get through this undamaged.

F CARR Carr, Robyn. *The life she wants* / MIRA Books, 2016

In the aftermath of her financier husband's suicide, Emma Shay Compton's dream life is shattered. Richard Compton stole his clients' life savings to fund a lavish life in NYC and, although she was never involved in the business, Emma bears the burden of her husband's crimes. She is left with nothing. So she goes home to Sonoma County. But starting over isn't easy, and Sonoma is full of unhappy memories, too. And people she'd rather not face, especially Riley Kerrigan. Riley and Emma were like sisters--until Riley betrayed Emma, ending their friendship. Emma left town, planning never to look back. Now, trying to stand on her own two feet, Emma can't escape her husband's reputation and is forced to turn to the last person she thought she'd ever ask for help--her former best friend. It's an uneasy reunion as both women face the mistakes they've made over the years.

F CORSON Corson, Grant. *The ratcatcher's son: an unauthorized biography*, 2013

"Orphaned at an early age in Dickensian England, young Jonathan Dalley, a ratcatcher's son, leaves his small village and finds himself crossing the broad Atlantic in 1857 on an aged ship, under the spell of two old pirates. In his travels, he encounters a one-legged man, a long-winded preacher, gypsies, a prostitute, and runaway slaves. His adventures thrust him into the middle of the Civil War and slavery, with all its horrors. Somehow he survives it all and finds what he has been searching for, the same dream we all chase. - (from the back cover)

F COULTER Coulter, Catherine. *The devil's triangle* / Gallery Books, 2017

"FBI Special Agents Nicholas Drummond and Michaela Caine are the government's Covert Eyes--leading a top-notch handpicked team of agents to tackle crimes and criminals both international and deadly. But their first case threatens their fledgling team when the Fox calls from Venice asking for help. Kitsune has stolen an incredible artifact from the Topkapi Museum in Istanbul, and now the client wants her dead. She has a warning for Nick and Mike: she's overheard talk that a devastating Gobi desert sandstorm that's killed thousands in Beijing isn't a natural phenomenon, rather is produced by man. F LACKY Lackey, Mercedes. The phoenix unchained / Tor, 2007

The struggle between good and evil heats up once again when Bisochim, a Wild Mage, becomes convinced of the need to bring Darkness back to the world after one thousand years of peace, while at the same time Tiercel, the oldest son of an Armethalian noble, rediscovers High Magick.

F LAMOUR L'Amour, Louis. The Californios / Bantam Books, 1974

"Captain Sean Mulkerin comes home from the sea to find his family's Malibu ranch in jeopardy. A volume of 10 previously uncollected short stories written early in his career. Famed for his contributions to the Western genre, L'Amour's skills as a writer transcended merely one subject, as he displays in the wide range of settings, styles, and characters in this collection.

F MATHESON Matheson, Richard. *The box: uncanny stories* / Tor, 2008

A collection of twelve horror and suspense stories from American writer Richard Matheson, including selections entitled "Button, Button," "A Flourish of Strumpets," "The Jazz Machine," and others.

F MAYOR Mayor, Archer. *Presumption of guilt* / Minotaur Books, 2016

A forty-year-old skeleton is found encased in a concrete slab at a recently decommissioned nuclear energy site. It becomes a case for the Vermont Bureau of Investigation (VBI) and its leader, Joe Gunther, since they have the resources and the ability to investigate an old, very cold, missing persons case that has now been reclassified as murder.

F MCCULLOUGH McCullough, Colleen. *Bittersweet: a novel* / Simon & Schuster, 2014

"Returning to the sweeping romantic saga, Colleen McCullough presents a new major work: the story of four unforgettable sisters navigating work, love, and their dreams in 1920s Australia. Because they are two sets of twins, the four Latimer sisters are as close as can be. They are famous throughout New South Wales for their beauty, wit, and ambition, but as they step into womanhood, they are not enthusiastic about the limited prospects life holds for them. F MORRISON Morrison, Toni. *Sula* / Penguin, 1982

"Toni Morrison's first novel, *The Bluest Eye* (1970), was acclaimed as the work of an important talent, written--as John Leonard said in *The New York Times*--in a prose "so precise, so faithful to speech and so charged with pain and wonder that the novel becomes poetry." Her new novel has the same power, the same beauty. At its center--a friendship between two women, a friendship whose intensity first sustains, then injures. Sula and Nel--both black, both smart, both poor, raised in a small Ohio town--meet when they are twelve, wishbone thin and dreaming of princes. Through their girlhood years they share everything--perceptions, judgments, yearnings, secrets, even crime--until Sula gets out, out of the Bottom, the hilltop neighborhood where beneath the sporting life of the men hanging around the place in headrags and soft felt hats there hides a fierce resentment at failed crops, lost jobs, thieving insurance men, bug-ridden flour...at the invisible line that cannot be overstepped. Sula leaps it and roams the cities of America for ten years. Then she returns to the town, to her friend. But Nel is a wife now, settled with her man and her three children. She belongs. She accommodates to the Bottom, where you avoid the hand of God by getting in it, by staying upright, helping out at church suppers, asking after folks--where you deal with evil by surviving it. Not Sula. As willing to feel pain as to give pain, she can never

accommodate. Nel can't understand her any more, and the others never did. Sula scares them. Mention her now, and they recall that she put her grandma in an old folks' home (the old lady who let a train take her leg for the insurance)...that a child drowned in the river years ago...that there was a plague of robins when she first returned. In clear, dark, resonant language, Toni Morrison brilliantly evokes not only a bond between two lives, but the harsh, loveless, ultimately mad world in which that bond is destroyed, the world of the Bottom and its people, through forty years, up to the time of their bewildered realization that even more than they feared Sula, their pariah, they needed her."

F PATTERSON Patterson, James. The black book / Little, Brown and Company, 2017

Being a cop runs in Billy Harney's family. The son of Chicago's Chief of Detectives whose twin sister, Patty, also followed in their father's footsteps, there's nothing Billy won't give up for the job, including his life. Left for dead alongside his tempestuous former partner and a hard-charging assistant district attorney out for blood, Billy miraculously survives. But he remembers nothing about the events leading up to the shootout. Charged with double murder and desperate to clear his name, Billy retraces his steps to get to the bottom of what happened. When he discovers the existence of a little black book that everyone who's anyone in Chicago will stop at nothing to get their hands on, Billy suspects it contains the truth that will either set him free ... or confirm his worst fears.

F PERRY Perry, Anne. Murder on the serpentine: a Charlotte and Thomas Pitt novel / Ballantine Books, 2017

"It is not the custom for the commander of Special Branch to receive a royal summons, so Thomas Pitt knows it must be for a matter of the gravest importance. The body of Sir John Halberd, the Queen's confidant, has been found in the shallow water of the Serpentine in Hyde Park, bearing the evidence of a fatal blow to the head. At Her Majesty's request, Sir John had been surreptitiously investigating Alan Kendrick, a horse-racing enthusiast who seems to have had an undue amount of influence on her son, the Prince of Wales. In Echo Park, in the small town of Santa Rita, California, the mutilated body of Martin Torrey is found by two passersby. A registered sex offender, Torrey has been a suspect in a string of recent rapes, and instant suspicion for his murder falls on the relatives and friends of the women attacked. Police chief Griffin Kells and detective Robert Ortiz are under increasing pressure from the public and from a mayor demanding results in a case that has no easy solution.

F SABERHAGEN Saberhagen, Fred. The lost swords, the second triad / Guild America Books, 1991

Young Kasimir was the custodian of Stonecutter, the sword which could hew mountains or diamonds with equal ease. But now Stonecutter has been stolen, and Kasimir must recover it before it causes irrevocable damage. "An entertainment of high order".--Publishers Weekly.

F STEEL Steel, Danielle. Dangerous games: a novel / Delacorte Press, 2017
